Klamath River Union Elementary is located along the wild and scenic Klamath River in far Northern California. At our remote, rural K-8 school the current ADA is 5. All students qualify for Free and Reduce lunch and Severe Need Breakfast. We have no English Learners at this time. There is little to moderate mobility.

Our school building has 2 classrooms, a well stocked library, kitchen and cafeteria situated on 7 beautifully maintained acres. We also have a large gym, garden and greenhouse.

The instructional ratio is virtually 1:1, providing for dynamic individualized attention, support and integration into appropriate academic levels.

A quality education is supported with use of standard based texts, materials, supplies and exciting and educational field trips.

Our instructional staff includes: one Teacher, one Intervention Specialist and one part-time instructional aide. Additional staff includes: an Office Manager/Cook, Van Driver and a Custodian/Maintenance person/lead Van Driver.

The staff is enthusiastic, hard working and supportive of each other, students and parents.

Klamath River Union Elementary strives to provide a challenging learning environment that encourages high expectations for success.

We promote a safe, orderly, caring, and supportive environment where every student's self-esteem is fostered by positive relationships with other students and staff.

Professional Development

Our teacher is offered several ways to participate in professional development ie. conferences, books , CD's , DVD's, online classes and internet webinars. There is opportunity to participate in district, county and state teacher in-services. Funds were available to support teachers professional growth through the Educator Effectiveness grant for 2016-2018. In January 2019 a teacher without multi-grade level experience was hired to teach. She was supported with Individual mentoring and in-class coaching was provided four hours per week from January 2019 through December 2019 to provide tools, resources and information regarding multi-grade level classroom and time management. In the spring and summer of 2020, training was provided in the use of online platforms for Distance Learning. District expectations and state standards were reviewed to ensure the continuity of the educational experience for our students during COVID-19.
